Occupational therapy practitioners are consumers of research, which enables them to be evidence-based practitioners

- Competencies of a Research Consumer:
- Identify <u>resources</u> in relation to a problem in clinical practice
- Demonstrate knowledge about experts in one's area
- Evaluate and critique research articles
- Identify, evaluate, and draw <u>logical conclusions</u> from theory and available data in relation to practice questions

- Faculty member selects research agenda/general topic of interest with multiple potential questions/phases (As part of Faculty Scholarship Plan)

 One question or phase per cycle (1 group; 4 semesters)

 One group of 3-5 students is assigned to the faculty member

### A note about Research Dissemination and Copy Rights:

The work produced for research projects in the Occupational Therapy Department takes place under the auspices of Touro College. Students contribute to these projects in order to fulfill required class assignments. Their work is being supervised by a faculty mentor who also serves as the principal investigator. As such, until such time when a project is published and copy rights transfer to the publisher, the copy rights of the research projects are held by the faculty mentor/principal investigator. Accordingly, students MAY NOT submit a proposal for conference presentation, write an article, or engage in any other dissemination activities without the written approval of the faculty mentor/principal investigator. Students may receive credit for their work in two ways:

- **a.** Students may be mentioned in the acknowledgements section of the article, book, or presentation.
- **b.** Students may be listed as co-authors. This will be done when students contribute to the development of the article/presentation beyond the requirements of the class (e.g., students may participate in revising several drafts of the article as required by the journal editor) AND with negotiations with the faculty mentor/principal investigator.
